Lecture-Concert: Children in Art and Music Saturday November 16, 7pm and Sunday November 17, 2pm

This event is presented by Catherine Douglas, Karen Sanford, and Sergio Ramirez. Sergio will first read a brief introduction for each painting and piano piece. In this way, the audience will have a more immersive experience with the combination of visual arts and music. Mutau Flat/Carrizo Rock Art Weekend October 12-13 2024



Join Maturango Museum for a special rock art excursion to Mutau Flat on a private ranch in Ventura County. We will view Chumash pictographs that were first noted in the 1870s, with archeological excavation by Agnes Bierman Babcock in the late 1940s and detailed analysis by Chumash rock art expert David Robinson in this century. The ranch is not open to the public and this is a rare opportunity to see this extensive Ventureño Chumash site with pictographs and bedrock mortars.

We will meet at the Ridge Route Museum, Frazier Park, for a quick museum tour and comfort stop early on Saturday morning, travel another hour over dirt roads to the ranch, and then tour the Flat guided by long time ranch owner Kathy Williams, local historian Bonnie Kane from Ridge Route, and Wind Wolves Preserve Archeologist Jack Sprague. Our day will last from 9am to 3pm. Some carpooling can be arranged at the ranch gate for folks who may not want to drive on the final dirt roads to the Flat, although most street vehicles should be fine. Moderate - good mobility necessary with hiking up to 1/2 mile over the meadow to the boulder outcrops and possibly a short shallow stream crossing if there's any water in the meadow in October. Bring a picnic lunch and water, hiking sticks, and dress for sun exposure. Pleasant fall temperatures should be daytime 70s and nighttime 40s.

On Sunday Oct. 13, Jack Sprague will guide us from Frazier Park to some seldom visited rock art sites (Selby Rocks pictographs) in the Carrizo Plain National Monument, about two hours from Frazier Park. Jack has many years archeological experience with Chumash sites in the San Emigdio Mountains, Carrizo, and Los Padres mountains; any rock art tour with him is a fascinating day. Our Carrizo trip will last from 8am to 2pm.

Convenient hotel/motel accommodations (Holiday Inn Express and Motel 6); gas available in Frazier Park/Lebec). Camping also available at private or public Forest Service campgrounds in Los Padres NF to the west of Frazier Park.


Fall is here aand with it comes shorter days and longer nights. We have two more super-moons coming; this year we are having four in a row. The last one, on September 17 also had a lunar eclipse. Super moons are when the moon is close to the earth and appears to be larger than usual. We had a very clear night on the 17th so the super-moon looked large, bright, and was sporting a dark shadow from the earth as it cleared the horizon.

In November the full moon will be on the 15th; hopefully the sky will be clear. There will be not be an eclipse this time, but the moon is always wondrous.

Another event to look for is the aurora borealis, aka, the Northern Lights. The sun has been very active with solar flares lately, some of the activity has been enough to make the northern lights visible here in the valley. https://www.space.com/32601-where-to-see-northern-lights.html

Tracking the Midnight Sun: A Journey to Norway 2pm Sunday October 27

Alice and Ken Atwood will present a travelogue about their recent trip to Norway. The presentation is part of the Museum Director lecture series and will be focused on their journey along the west coast of the country beginning in the town of Bergen and proceeding north to the Svalbard archipelago and then a southbound return.

The cruise, referred to as the Svalbard Express, was made on the MS Trollfjord of the Hurtigruten line. The journey was 15-29 June so it included the 2024 summer



solstice; the plan was to experience the midnight sun. A trip extension to Oslo, 29 June -1 July was made and will be included.

This presentation will be in the form of a travelogue taking the audience along the west coast, crossing of the arctic circle in the fishing village of Traena and a foggy visit to the North Cape. The North Cape is the most northerly point on the European continent. Our voyage will then take us further north across the Barents Sea to Svalbard. The hamlet of Ny-Alesund is the northern most occupied village on earth and it is our last stop before beginning our return south.

The return voyage south includes stops along the beautiful and important fishery of the Lofoten archipelago. A short visit to the Geiranger fjord and Trollford (namesake of our ship) were made before our return and disembarkation in Bergen.

Images from the very modern and progressive city of Oslo include the new Munch museum (yes, including the Scream) as well as some images of the Oslo city hall where the Nobel Peace Prize is awarded. Do you know that swans represent the soul of Oslo?


The presentation is not intended as a photographic essay but will hopefully convey the resilience, and beauty of Norway through a glimpse of its landscape, wildlife and geography.

China Lake Soaring Club - a Brief History

The China Lake Soaring Club has a rich history that dates back to the late 1940s. It all began with Al Sievert and a group of like-minded individuals purchasing a war surplus TG-2 training glider in 1948. This glider, originally used for pilot training by the US military, became the foundation for the club's soaring activities above the Indian Wells Valley. In 1953, the club was officially incorporated as the China Lake Soaring Club.

Around 1962, the club replaced the TG-2 with a newer model, the Schweizer 2-22C two-seater training glider. The members' passion for soaring extended to building their own gliders, despite having no prior experience in construction. This enthusiasm led to the completion of various glider projects, including a high-performance

Breigleb BG-12 by Charlie Drew and a medium-performance Schweizer 1-26 by Dr. Bill McEwan, both of whom participated in the Southern California Soaring championships.

Today, you can learn more about the local history of soaring in the Indian Wells Valley by visiting the exhibit "Soaring - Flying High on the Power of Rising Air" at the Maturango Museum. The exhibit features an actual glider, the "Grob 102 Club III B" single-seat glider, and provides a fascinating insight into the sport of soaring.

Burrowing Owl Volunteer Days at Hanning Flat

The Kern River Valley Heritage Foundation will be hosting 2 volunteer service weekends October 12-13 and October 19-20 (8:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m.) at Hanning Flat. We will be constructing 10 new artificial burrows for burrowing owls.



Over the past few years, volunteers have helped construct 15 burrows, some of which were used by the owls within days of their completion! This year we were rewarded with a mating pair of burrowing owls that stayed at Hanning Flat all winter and produced a family of 7 owlets in May!

We are hoping that you will join us in October to help with this very successful project. Please bring a hat, gloves, water, lunch, a chair, and a shovel. Primitive camping will be available at Hanning Flat for those who may want to join us all weekend. There will be lunchtime presentations discussing the life cycle and habits of burrowing owls.
