A few minutes before dawn, on a mid-July day with the temperature hanging tens of degrees below zero, nine mountaineers from China Lake commenced a day of adventure that set an American climbing record lasting for years.

This is the story of the 1967 ascent of Denali, reaching an elevation of 20,320 feet. It covers the team's equipment, physical preparation, testing and practice in the Sierras, and the final spectacular grind to the summit of Denali.

Join surviving team members Bob Westbrook and Jim Nichols for the presentation; the show will feature photos, videos, and displays of expeditionary mountaineering trappings from that era.

"Soaring on The Eastern Side of The Sierras" – A Talk by Cindy Brickner Sunday January 12, 2 pm

What makes soaring on the eastern side of the Sierra Nevada so special? Join airplane and soaring pilot Cindy Brickner as she discusses the art of soaring in this unique region and shares other fascinating insights about the sport.

While in high school in Palmdale, CA Cindy worked as a receptionist at a local glider flight school and started soaring. Three years later, she worked at the national headquarters of the Soaring Society of America (SSA), then in Santa Monica, CA. She held

many positions at the SSA and gained valuable business and soaring skills during this time.

In 1990, she decided to open her own soaring school in California City. For two decades, she taught soaring, towed sailplanes to altitude, and offered national training seminars. Her soaring accomplishments include seven U.S. national records for speed and distance flights. Her longest soaring flight is over 600 miles and 13.5 hours in duration. Her highest altitude achieved is 32,500 feet msl (mean sea level).

Cindy currently teaches soaring at two locations, El Mirage and Inyokern.

What are coyote gourds? That is the common name for Cucurbita palmata, a flowering plant in the squash family. The plant bears spherical fruits that are dark green or yellow and get thinner rinds as they age. The fruits are inedible but the Native Americans used them for soap and also ground the seeds to use as food. They also used the dried gourds as rattles.

For Free Second Saturday in December the docents found another use for coyote gourds that grow all around the Indian Wells Valley. We

drilled holes in the top, used large paper clips for hangers (thank you Barbara Ingle for the idea), painted them white and had Museum visitors decorate them with markers and all sorts of sparkly stick-on designs! Visitors for the winter solstice celebration made tea light lanterns that Elaine Wiley designed; she takes the lead on our solstice and equinox celebrations.

Terry McGuire and Fran Kelty have been training on using the Beth Armogida Planetarium. Mike Herr has donated time to help them learn to use the planetarium. Sherry Brubaker has already trained to use it but we need to have several people available to use it. We are getting requests for the planetarium in January!


The spring schedule of Children's Hour will be available on-line in early January at Maturango.org and on Facebook.

Spring Field Trip: Southern Amargosa Valley (Tecopa Valley) Friday evening February 28 - Sunday afternoon March 2

The Southern Amargosa Valley (also known as the Tecopa Valley) is a wonderful place to explore; full of history and natural wonders. It is located just East of the Southern end of Death Valley. We'll start our journey Friday night (February 28) in the little town of Tecopa with a social and brief overview of the weekend's activities. Exact time and location will be provided to registered participants as the date gets closer. On Saturday morning (March 1) we'll meet at the Shoshone Museum at 9 am in Shoshone where a staff member will greet us and walk us through the museum. We'll have time to explore the history of the area as curated by the museum's inside and outside displays before reconvening for a short ride (less than a mile) to Dublin Gulch.






Dublin Gulch contains the remnants of homes dug into the hillsides in the late 1800s. After some time to explore the Dublin Gulch area, we'll drive roughly 20 miles to the Tecopa Mines where we'll be met by the mine's owner who will give us a two-hour walking tour of part of the mine and discuss its history. From Tecopa Mines we'll drive to the China Date Ranch where we'll have the chance to enjoy one of their famous date shakes or some of their baked goods or dates and eat what will be a late picnic lunch (no host) at the picnic tables near the Amargosa River trailhead. After lunch

we'll take a hike down to the Amargosa River and discuss this amazing wild and scenic river that runs

mostly underground. We'll return via a loop trail to the trailhead and our vehicles. Dinner and the rest of the evening is on your own. There are a few restaurants in Tecopa and one in Shoshone.

Sunday morning (March 2) at 8:45 am we'll meet for a tour at the famous Amargosa Opera House in Death Valley Junction where Marta Becket once dazzled audiences with her ballet performances.

For those who are interested in extending the tour a bit further, we'll travel up to Ash Meadows National Wildlife Refuge and take a



For those interested in taking the tour, book accommodations as soon as possible. There are limited rooms available at the Amargosa Opera House in Death Valley Junction and the nearby Longstreet Hotel and Casino, in Shoshone at the Shoshone Inn, and a couple of hotels in Tecopa. Be aware that accommodations in Death Valley Junction, Shoshone, and Tecopa are a bit rustic. More modern accommodations and eating options can be found in Pahrump NV about 30 minutes from Shoshone.

The drive to the Tecopa mines is partially on a well graded dirt road with about a 1 mile section on an unimproved dirt road. A high-clearance vehicle is recommended for this last mile (a Subaru or similar should be fine). No 4WD required. Also, should you choose to travel through Death Valley to meet us, you will need to pay the park entrance fee not included in the tour cost.

The tour cost will be \$275 for members and \$350 for non-members and will include light snacks at Friday night's social (no host drinks), donation for the Shoshone museum, Tecopa Mine tour fee, and the Amargosa Opera House tour fee. Cancelations prior to the 7th of February will receive a 100% refund. Cancelations after the 7th but before the 21st will receive a 50% refund. Cancelations after the 21st will receive no refund.

Winter is here! Our migratory birds are on the move... By Sherry Brubaker, Natural History Curator

Winter is here! Our migratory birds are on the move and the ones that "winter over" are out foraging. We can help our feathered friends by offering food and water. Keeping feeders and water sources clean (10% bleach, soap and warm water) helps minimize infections; make sure the feeders are thoroughly rinsed and dry before refilling. Using a good quality bird feed, not one with lots of corn, is better for the birds.

Something else that is helpful year around is keeping birds from flying into windows. Using anti-collision adhesives on windows provides greater visibility to prevent collisions. Many birds fly at night so reducing lighting, diming and pointing lights downward, is a big help.

And our snow geese are here; geese like grass - they will be in yards with grass, they will poop and they are messy. The geese will also walk in the road, slow down and they will move (slowly). Hitting one is fatal to the bird and there is no source of local veterinary care if one is injured. So please slow down and enjoy our feathered friends!

Debbie says "I work mainly in watercolor on 100% cotton paper. I start my paintings by strategically applying water to the paper then introducing watercolor and inks into the wet surface. Then using gravity, pipettes, brushes and sometimes branches and twigs, the journey begins.

I love to carefully observe the mingling of the water, paints and ink traveling and creating the soft and hard edges which help define the shapes and focal areas. My paintings are full of movement, and the viewer can almost follow the path that the paint traveled."
