Buy a Brick is Back!... Missed it last time? Now's Your Chance.



Kern Plateau Meadows Field Trip with Anne Dumas Saturday July 19

Let's head to the high country! Join the Maturango Museum on a tour of several meadows on the Kern Plateau.

The Kern Plateau is a relatively flat area between 7,500 and 8,500 feet in elevation. There are about 30 meadows with streams and rich soil abundant with plants and flowers. Some years, there are lots of frogs! It will be fun to explore in the cool mountain air. The meadows we could visit include: Troy, Powell, Granite Knob, Paloma, Bonita and Osa.

Meet at the museum at 7am. You will be required to sign a liability waiver. Great trip for kids and leashed well-behaved dogs.

Buy tickets on the museum website <u>maturango.org/events</u> The cost is \$35 for museum members (\$60 for 2 members), \$45 nonmembers (\$80 for 2). Kids under 18 are free.

Cancellation Policy: If the Museum cancels your trip, you will be given a full refund or you may transfer the money to a different trip. No cash refunds will be given if you cancel.

Carpooling is encouraged, but not required. For those driving, be sure your vehicle is in good repair and that it has a full tank of gas. We will be driving approximately 200 miles round trip on our day long adventure. We will return to the museum in the evening. (Or you could drive up and over Sherman Pass and head home through Kernville.)

Be sure to bring a picnic lunch and plenty of water. Once we pass the Kennedy Meadows General Store, there is no place to buy food or drinks. Also, if you like, bring a folding chair, a rain jacket, hiking poles, bug spray, hat and sunscreen.

You'll start with a blank mini pizza crust and add various vegetables and sauces; then we'll cook the pizzas and enjoy eating them or take home.


Our visiting guest will be Tera Moorehead, a certified nutritionist, to explain the nutritional value of the ingredients.

Visitors enjoy observing our tortoises at the Museum tortoise enclosure. All of the tortoises in the enclosure are pets. For their protection, no wild tortoises can be removed from their habitat. Recently, we acquired 2 tortoises from Judy Breitenstein who passed away earlier this year. She had them for a long time. During the yard sale, a young girl ran up to Maureen to tell her that one of the tortoises was on its back. She was rightfully very worried about the tortoise. Sometimes they can flip themselves back over and sometimes they can't. It is dangerous for a tortoise not to be able to move out of the heat into a cooler place. Thank goodness the girl alerted us. I opened the tortoise enclosure gate and let the child go in and turn the tortoise back over. We are so grateful that the girl (see photo) was so observant and saved the tortoise!

Another way to help our local wildlife has been brought to our attention. Several of the wild burros are getting hit and killed on the roads. Inyo County and the Bureau of Land Management began a campaign to inform the public about the problem. Some people stop to feed the wild burros. Therefore, the burros start to associate cars with food and will go out into the roadway. Please remember and remind others not to feed the wild burros. Instead go out to the BLM Wild Horse and Burro Facility

just off of Ridgecrest Blvd., bring a big bunch of carrots, and feed all these wonderful animals. You will not have even one carrot to bring home!

The Museum thanks Glenn Harris for a wonderful free Saturday program on insects. He made 55 insect kits for visitors!

Each artist will also have a sample of their artwork displayed in the 2-month Open Studio Tour Exhibit (August 31 – Oct 27) at the Museum and be a part of the Artists' Opening Reception (Sunday September 14, 2-4pm).

Warner Graves' Art Exhibit: "Other Worlds"

Warner Graves is an artist known for his contemporary take on the rugged beauty of the California desert. Using bold color, broad brush strokes, line and texture and reacting to intuitive impulses, the work unfolds as an exploration of the natural world and its lore. From a vintage stone cabin in Snow Creek, (a small secluded village at the foot of Mt. San Jacinto), Warner creates paintings of simplified and stylized forms to convey the monumentality and spiritual awe of the surrounding desert wilderness. The work is strongly rooted to the various locations in and around the arid regions of

California and reflects interest ranging from historic travel posters, the natural sciences, hiking, and getting lost in the desert.

The playful use of color is a direct reference to the Canadian Group of Seven. Local early 20th century artist Agnes Pelton and her associated Taos School of Transcendental Art continues to be a source of inspiration. With the current series Warner hopes the viewer finds the beauty in the depiction of the desert environment but is also challenged to see the natural world not as a static form but as a living entity, imbued with vitality and flux.

This fantastic exhibit will be in the Coso Room through August 24.

Pacific Crest Trail Photo Exhibit April 21 – September 21

This 2,650-mile trail winds through some of the most inspiring and beautiful landscapes in the United States. It begins at the border of Mexico and leads backpackers through California, Oregon, and Washington, ending at the Canadian border. Or start in Washington and travel south to Mexico.

The PCT traverses nine mountain ranges, 25 national forests, seven national

parks, and numerous wilderness areas. Exploring this untamed wilderness offers a unique opportunity to experience a diverse range of terrain, flora, fauna, and wildlife that characterize the western United States.

Renowned photographer Bob Steele captured the stunning beauty of the trail using an iPhone while hiking the PCT with his wife, Susan, in 2016. They spent 5 months and 11 days on the trail, taking time to photograph the scenery and indulge in Susan's passion for birdwatching.
