"But it's a Dry HEAT"

We all know how hot the desert gets in the summer. Now for a little perspective... Did you know that the desert around the Dead Sea is often in the high 120s°F to low 130s°F every summer for months? Like Death Valley, 90 miles to the east of us, also gets that hot. Here in Indian Wells Valley we don't always get that hot for that long. This summer alone we've barley hit 110°F. Unusual for us but who's going to complain? Palm Springs has nearly reached 120°F but not the usual long stretches like last summer. Imagine playing golf in that heat? That's why golf courses in the Palm Springs area have ballpark-type lights so folks can play at night.

Night-time also allows the air to cool; this is desirable for sleeping and allowing the body to recover from the day's heat. When the air doesn't cool, and we all run our A/Cs, a whole new set of issues arise like power usage, environmental damage, and animal behavior changes.

I usually experience ants in my home when the heat increases. They're coming in to find food, water, and of course, cool air. Don't despair! Cooler days and nights are coming; then we'll complain about the cold. Remember this heat in December. Then we can talk about the deserts of Greenland and Antarctica.

Celebration of the September Equinox Saturday September 20, 10 am - noon Create a Junk Journal (collage) Card

The September equinox is approaching! The word 'equinox' comes from the Latin words 'aequus,' meaning equal, and 'nox,' meaning night. Therefore, 'equinox' translates to 'equal night' in Latin, symbolizing the nearly equal length of day and night. This marks the transition from longer summer days to shorter winter days for us in the Northern Hemisphere. Days from now until the winter solstice grow shorter each day, and the nights grow longer. The winter solstice marks a turning point where the days begin to grow longer and the nights shorter.

At the Maturango Museum, we enjoy celebrating the four times each year when the Earth and sun experience a special relationship: the equinoxes and solstices. This connection helps us stay in tune with the changing seasons.

Join us as we create celestial greeting cards in the style of "Junk Journaling". A Junk Journal card is a handmade creation that uses various papers, pockets, and tags to craft an engaging greeting card with spaces to tuck in a handmade note or greeting. Arrive by 10am to give yourself plenty of time to explore the different options available for your card-making experience.

As a bonus, the China Lake Astronomical Society may bring their solar scopes for visitors to view the sun safely. Members' participation depends on their schedule and the weather.

Maturango Museum Field Trip to Devil's Punchbowl Natural Area Saturday, October 18, 10:30am – 2:30pm

Nestled in the San Gabriel Mountains, this stunning geological wonder offers a unique opportunity to explore dramatic rock formations, vibrant desert landscapes, and the dynamic forces that shaped this region.

Our adventure begins at 10:30 am at the Devil's Punchbowl Nature Center near Pearblossom, Southern California. We'll enjoy a presentation on the geology and history of the



Punchbowl at the scenic View Point. Learn about the tectonic forces and erosion that created the Punchbowl's iconic tilted sandstone layers and rugged canyons.

Following the presentation, we'll embark on a guided one-mile loop hike into the Punchbowl canyon, offering breathtaking views of the striking rock formations and surrounding desert and mountain terrain. The trail features moderate inclines and rocky paths, so sturdy hiking shoes and perhaps walking sticks are recommended.

We'll wrap up the day by 2:30 pm, leaving time to enjoy the scenic beauty of the area or relax at the Nature Center.

What to Bring:

- Comfortable hiking shoes
- Water bottle (at least 1 liter)
- Sunscreen and hat
- Light layers for cool mornings and warm afternoons
- Snacks for the trail

This family-friendly trip is perfect for geology enthusiasts,

hikers, and anyone eager to discover the natural beauty of the Devil's Punchbowl. Don't miss this chance to explore one of Southern California's most remarkable landscapes!

Buy tickets on the museum website <u>maturango.org/events</u> The cost is \$35 for museum members (\$60 for 2 members), \$45 nonmembers (\$80 for 2). Kids under 18 are free.

Historic Equipment at the Maturango Museum

We recently received old farming and mining equipment from the Desert Empire Fairgrounds. Previously, this equipment was stored in a fenced area located east of the Model Railroad building, where the Eastern Sierra Railroad Society has its model trains set up.

The equipment is part of Dick Lewis' estate. He came to the Indian Wells Valley in 1936 at the age of 14 to live with Tiny and Earl Standard, early settlers in this area. He purchased the Homestead Restaurant in 1975, where he served delicious meals and a bit of local history complemented by various historic items adorning the walls.

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Travel Presentation: Peru's Upper Amazon Sunday October 5, 2pm

Alice and Ken Atwood will present a talk on their trip to the Upper Amazon. In February 2025 they explored the 2 major rivers, Marañon and Ucayali, that make up the Amazon River confluence.

The Pacaya-Samiria Preserve is a National Park comprised of over 5 million acres. It is a biodiverse rain forest that is home to a wide variety of animals and plants. The presentation will include phots of some of the animals including Pink Dolphin, Saki Monkey and Pigmy Marmoset.
